

# WaterSMART Water and Energy Efficiency Grants



Approximately \$140 million in IIJA and FY25 appropriations funding for 40-50 awards

50% match

Up to \$500,000 for projects to be completed within two years

Up to \$2 million for projects to be completed within three years

Up to \$5 million for large projects to be completed within three years

Application Due Date: November 13, 2024

•Supports projects that result in quantifiable and sustained water savings, implement renewable energy components, and support broader sustainability benefits.

- •Water conservation projects include canal lining/piping, municipal metering, irrigation flow measurement, Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition and Automation, landscape irrigation measures, high-efficiency indoor appliances and fixtures, and commercial cooling systems.
- •Renewable energy projects include developing new hydropower capacity or uprating the capacity of an existing hydropower facility, bringing existing mothballed hydropower capacity back online, and installing solar-electric, wind energy, or geothermal power systems.
- Limited geographic eligibility Western United States or United States Territories.

## Where did the money go?

## Award Breakdown

- \$105 million in funding awarded
- 64 projects were selected out of 154 applications creating about a 44% success rate
- Of the 64 projects funded, 43 were for projects in special districts which means almost 68% of the funding went to special districts

## What to Expect

- FY 2025 applications are due November 13, 2024
- The process is getting more competitive, and districts will need to be prepared to WOW Reclamation.





## Assistance to Firefighter Grants (AFG)

\$324 million in FY23 appropriations funding for approximately 2,000 awards

Match is dependent on applicant size and ranges from 5% to 15%

The ranges for awards differs based on population of area served with the smallest communities receiving no more than \$1 million and the largest communities receiving no more than \$9 million

Anticipated Solicitation Date: Winter 2024

- •Provides critically needed resources that equip and train emergency personnel to recognize standards, enhance operational efficiencies, foster interoperability, and support community resilience.
- •Funding can be used for training, equipment, personal protective equipment, wellness and fitness, modifications to facilities, and vehicle acquisition.
- Each year, FEMA selects high priority project types. Projects seeking funding that aligns with the annual priorities will be more competitive.
- The application is essentially comprised of and reviewed in two different sections. The first is data driven and the second includes more narrative on the project. If a project does not meet a minimum threshold in the data evaluation, it will not move on in the review process.

# Where did the money go?

## Award Breakdown

- \$324 million in funding awarded
- 1,635 projects were selected... unsure of total number of applications submitted
- Of the 1,635 projects funded, approximately 175 were for projects in special districts which means about 11% of the funding went to special districts... could be more

## What to Expect

- FY 2024 solicitation expected to open in early 2025
- Applications are based on data and high priorities that differ each year
- Reach out to your neighbors for support and collaboration


